Reflections from the Rector

We had the opportunity again this August, as we did last, to gather as a community at home forums to continue to reflect upon, talk about, measure, and envision our call to mission and ministry as a community. God has indeed called us to be Good Samaritan to this community by witnessing to God's broad healing and mercy. We offer healing of fear and loneliness with God's presence and love; healing the wounds with God's healing and transforming power; healing of divisions with God's proclamation that the creation is "good"; healing basic needs of water, food and shelter with a God who gives sacrificially.

As I reflect upon our mission in light of our namesake I find myself this time around focusing upon the unnamed inn keeper and the Inn. It seems to me that while he is accidental to the story he actually plays a significant role in the healing of the man who is beaten, robbed, and left for dead.

First, he simply could have said "no" to the Samaritan. I am not certain how many of us welcome beaten and bloodied strangers for an unlimited period of time into our establishments, (unless we are working in hospice-itals). And yet our unnamed inn keeper welcomes and extends hospitality. It is a reminder to us that we continue to ensure that we are as welcoming of the weary and bloodied as our inn keeper.

Second, any sensible person would make certain that they had a credit card or collateral to hold in case expenses exceeded initial payment and the Samaritan disappeared. And yet the unnamed inn keeper exhibits trust in our Samaritan. Perhaps because the character of the fellow, a character revealed in his compassion towards this

stranger. It is a reminder to us that maybe we can earn the trust of the world outside our doors when we show compassion to the stranger and towards one another.

Third, the Samaritan's mission may actually have failed in the long term had it not been for the inn keeper. Indeed, our Samaritan stopped and began the healing process for this stranger but the completion of the healing needed assistance. He could not do it alone. It is evident in the story that the Samaritan had business to attend to and could not delay to care for this man. The Samaritan left the care to the Inn and then set off on his way. He does not linger to deal with the rehabilitation himself but entrusts the beaten man to someone else, to a stranger, to an inn keeper. It is a reminder that we are not in this healing business alone, any more than the Good Samaritan in the story. Some of us are called to scour the roadside looking for the lost, some of us are inn keepers who welcome, some of us are cooks who feed and nourish, some of us are friends that change bandages, some of us are story tellers to encourage. The truth is the Good Samaritan does not heal alone but there is a cast of unnamed characters who take over. There is a real team aspect to this ministry of healing, all dovetailing into one another.

Again, while it required the healing mission of the Good Samaritan to begin the ministry, it required the healing work of a hospitable and trusting community to continue and finish. It appears the Good Samaritan played his role and used his gift of compassion to heal but could go no further. The inn takes over with all who remain unnamed to continue that healing according to their talents.

Good Vibes at the Parish Home Forums: "Healing - What Can It Mean?"

More than 75 parishioners gathered at four different homes to share their feelings and thoughts about what Good Samaritan is and what it can be. The sentiment we heard is that Good Sam is a "healing" church in many ways - connecting to Christ in an engaging worship, offering a strong array of outreach activities, and incorporating lots of prayer and caring. However, the creative ideas and thoughts shared by parishioners made it clear that there is more we can do to grow further, especially in reaching out to young Christians and their families. The format permitted an open sharing of views and ideas and we are grateful to Esther and Jan Stearns, Harry and Mary Mathis, Brian and Tracy Jewell, and Joan Broughton, for opening their homes and hosting these forums. A special treat for everyone at the forums was hearing from our new music director, Braden McKinley, and our new campus missionary, Laurel

Mathewson – they shared their walk with Christ and their views about what young adults might be looking for in a Christian community. Braden started each forum with a solo song which quieted us all down and Laurel ended each forum in prayer. The formal program started with Fr. Chase reflecting on how he came to consider that "healing" might be a suitable yet challenging theme for Good Samaritan, how it encompasses so many of the things we embrace and care about as Christians. We then discussed three areas, healing, worship, and connecting with young Christians, in response to four specific questions: (a) "In what ways do you feel Good Sam is or could be a healing church?"; (b) "What aspects of our worship service connect you to Christ?"; (c) "How might the proposal to continue with one primary service at 9:30 on Sundays affect the way that God calls us to create community?"; and (d) "In what ways do you feel we are/could be reaching out to UCSD students and to young adults and families?" While many common themes came forth, the list of responses which were shared was very broad and creative, and simply too long to report in any detail here. The number of distinct responses to these four questions from the four forums approaches 100 and perhaps the more important outcome was simply the sharing and discussion which took place. It was clear at all of the forums that there is considerable support, even enthusiasm, to continue with one primary worship service at 9:30 on Sundays, acknowledging that it creates a stronger sense of community and may project a more welcoming worship service to newcomers. Concerns about the proposal were expressed regarding how Christian education would be affected and regarding the desirability to provide some type of an earlier quiet worship experience. To provoke ongoing thought and discussion about these important topics we will post all of the brief recorded responses in Roetter

Hall during the coming weeks while we proceed to set priorities and new directions. The discussions around the four questions were followed by a very brief review of our history, our organizational 'fractal' structure, and our budget, how we receive and how we spend our funds. The ways in which last year's forums impacted this year's budget in the areas of outreach, fellowship, and education were pointed out, as well as the substantial effort made to work with the Diocese to call an associate priest to Good Sam who would work with Fr. Chase on campus ministry. While budgetary challenges at the Diocesan level made it necessary to set this search aside, one positive outcome has been the recruitment of Laurel to serve as part time campus missionary. The Vestry continues to feel that these home forums are welcome and valuable as we proceed to consider budget priorities, new programs, and staffing in the coming months. The healthy spirit and commitment expressed by so many at the forums will encourage us as we begin our fall stewardship program, which will culminate at our Ingathering Dinner on Sunday, November 15th. Thank you for your participation, your support, your patience, and your prayers.

Treasurer's Report

Our offering income during July was less than expected (as it has been for the last few months), but this month

it was more than made up for by investments that did well. Another factor leading to lower income was the fact that the Newman Center is on summer schedule and they are not using our facility as much as other months.

Both our Clergy Expenses and our Staff Expenses were less than expected due to our not having yet hired the assistant priest/campus missionary and the music director as planned. Our administration expenses for July were about \$2,077 less than expected due to a large number of factors.

Overall, both our income and our expenses were less than expected, but our actual income and expenses were virtually identical (the net difference was \$0.70). The totals for the first half of the year show that we are about \$10,304 ahead.

Building Fund

We are no longer raising money for a future building project, so why do we still have a Building Fund? All the money in the Building Fund was used to pay for the restoration of Roetter Hall and for the reduction of the loan that we have with Torrey Pines Bank for that same project. Currently, any money that is being donated to the Building Fund is being used to reduce the principal on the \$680,000 loan. Any reduction in the principal saves us the interest of 6.5% that we are paying. That would be the equivalent of getting 6.5% on an investment, which would be a really good deal at this time. So I would encourage you to help pay off this loan soon by donating to the Building Fund.

Audit of 2008 Financials

The audit of last year's books has been completed and there is a copy of the report in the front office for your inspection. If you have any questions, please ask.

Youth Group News

Youth Group volunteers at CCSA

Saturday August 15, 2009 was the day of the Christian Community Service Agency (CCSA) work that the Good Sam youth group did. And boy, was it fun! First, we all started working on the food items generous people from churches, including Good Sam, had donated for those families in need. It all started at 9 a.m. We had a total of 7 adults (2 were grandmas!) and 6 children from Good Sam.

There were two tables - one table was for food cans to be packed into plastic grocery bags, and the other table was for food cans/boxes to be packed into brown paper bags. There was a smaller group working with the plastic bags than the paper ones. After a brown paper bag was filled with all the food items necessary, it was put into a plastic bag so that it's easy to carry around. Then, one or two of us would take the brown paper bags to a room right around the corner and set it down there. There was beef stew, corn, fruit cocktails, macaroni and much more. Packing all that food took all of about 45 minutes, but all of it was worth the time.

After all the food packing was done, we started working on backpacks for students K - 12. We took supplies from a storage shed and set them around four tables, in the order of a list so it would be much easier to pack. Some backpacks were already filled, with some school supplies that were missing, and other backpacks were completely empty!

We worked until about 12 noon, but everyone was happy that we got to see the next step to the collection of food items and school supplies.

The Survey Results Are In

As expected, Facebook is not being used as an information resource -- but then with only 33 fans of our page (and not all of them Good Sammers either), that didn't surprise me. It's still a new way of reaching people, but unfortunately, I think including it at such an early stage rather skewed the results.

Let's look at the other results: 81 people responded to the survey. Roughly 26% of them were under 45, the remaining 74% were older.

When split into age groups, an interesting trend was revealed (see charts to the right): older respondents got most of their information out of the Tidings (36%); younger respondents got most of their information from the email newsletter (37%). Older respondents were then split evenly between getting the most information they needed out of the Notes or email (29%); the younger respondents then looked to the Tidings (25%) and then the Notes (21%).

Aside from not many people looking at Facebook (60% overall), the respondents read the website the least (29% overall, 26% older, 43% younger). The only other significant result was that the email newsletter got no votes from the younger respondents on the question of whether it was read the least.

So what now? There are some ideas bubbling. We've restored the Good Sam Notes to the bulletin for those who commented that the reason they read it the least was because they couldn't find it on a Sunday. Other handwritten survey comments are being taken into consideration.

It's clear that the website is not primarily used by anybody as an information source, but we know that it is very helpful for people who are seeking a church. The website will not be vanishing but I think that its focus will change to look outward. There'll

still be a place to find the information regular churchgoers need.

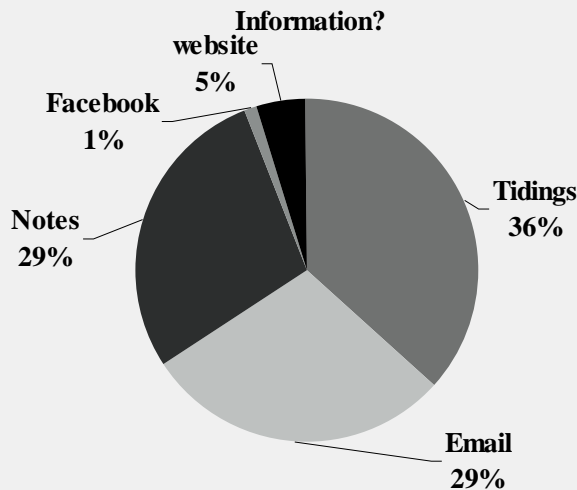

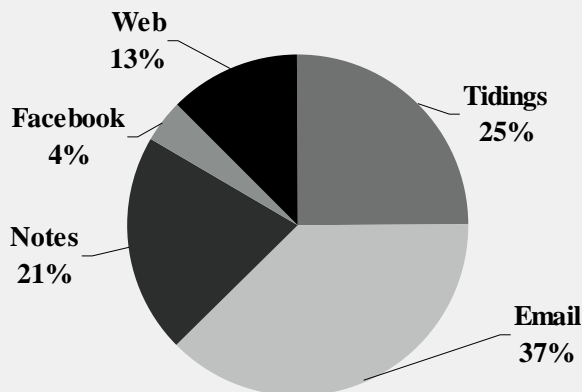

Good Samaritan of the Month

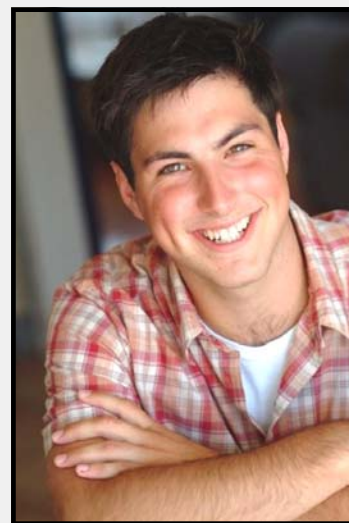
It's September, the **RRR** (Ruth the Roving Reporter) hopes you all had a great summer. Please join me in welcoming Braden McKinley, our new music director! My family and I have known Braden this past year through St Paul's Cathedral, where he's been the organ scholar. He will continue to work with the Cathedral Boy Choristers and the St Cecilia Girls Choir when they rehearse and sing the wonderful weekly Evensong services.

(RRR) We are so happy and excited to have you join the Good Sam family. Please tell us about your family, and your background. I know you are only 23!

(Braden) I grew up in Carlsbad. My family and I live in Vista. My parents' names are David and Melinda. I have 3 older brothers: Caleb(29), Jordan(27), and Casey(25). My sister, you already know, Addie(16) sings with the girls choir at St Paul's. They all attend various churches, but my parents go to St Michaels-by-the-Sea in Carlsbad. I have a girl friend, Ashley Noble. We've been dating over a year and a half. You'll get to meet her, I'm sure! I went to Tri- City Christian High in Vista, only for a year. I went on to Palomar College for their music program. I graduated from the University of California, Irvine, where I had a major in voice, in 2008.

(RRR) So how old were you when you started your career in music?

(Braden) I was 8 years old. I was playing soccer, and my coach suggested I check out the Choristers in St Paul's. I was a member of the Choristers till I was 14. I sang alto a bit, but then, I was busy with Palomar College. My maternal grandmother was a pianist and organist. And I got my singing genes from my paternal grandfather. I think Casey and Addie are the only vocally gifted ones in the family. Addie also plays piano. Casey plays the guitar and piano. Jordan plays drums and guitar. And Caleb plays the radio! I was 18 when we were attending All Saints in Vista. The music director at the time, Carol Graham, pressed me into service! She was the one who encouraged me to learn the organ. I started studying with Canon Martin Green in 2008.

(RRR) Please tell us how you first heard of the opening for the music director position at Good Sam.

(Braden) I heard about the job opening from Chris, whom I had become friends with through working with Episcopal Campus Ministry at UCSD the last two years. When the job opened, Chris approached me about it, but with me recently starting the job at St. Paul's, I didn't want to leave so soon. Plus I felt I needed a little more experience. As the year went on, and Chris was still looking for someone, I continually felt God leading me to apply for the job. Due to various reasons however, I resisted the call, but again God kept the door open, and inspired me to go ahead with it. After I officially put myself up for consideration, I had a phone interview with the search committee. About a month later, I was asked to lead the music for the service at Good Sam as an audition. And here I am!

(RRR) What is your favorite music? I know this is a vague question. I mean other than work or church music. What do you listen to on your own? And do you sing or play the piano with a group?

(Braden) My musical taste is rather eclectic. I enjoy everything from Jazz, Folk, Celtic, Alternative Rock, Alt- Country, Classic Rock to Opera and Classical. For example, right now I am listening to Miles Davis. Earlier in the car, I was listening to the Christian pop group Jars of Clay. On my iPod, I was listening to a mix of U2, Van Morrison, and The Band. So as you can see, it's all across the board. From the time I was 8, I've been an intense music collector, immersing myself in whatever kind of music interested me at the time. When I was 8, and was beginning in piano and voice, my dad played for our family the film, "Amadeus", based on the life of Mozart. That got me interested in classical music, and I would say that all roads led from there! At the moment, I play accordion and keyboards in a Folk/ Pop band called Raven's Grace, with my brother, Casey. We've played around town on and off for a few years now. I'm hoping to set up some kind of concert at Good Sam, so keep your fingers crossed that it happens. My brother is more of the composer than I am. He writes great songs, while I sing and play along.

(RRR) We heard you and Casey during the Convention at Good Sam early this year. I am looking forward to more! How about your vision for music at Good Sam?

(Braden) In regards to my vision for Good Sam, among the things I've truly admired about the community at Good Samaritan are their warmth, vibrancy, and passion for God and the Gospel. My desire is to continue in that vein. I want the

music become a powerful vehicle to propel our Worship, turning our hearts and minds towards the humble adoration of the Father, Son and Holy Spirit. So that we would approach our time at the mass in reverence, with humility and an attentiveness to the Holy Spirit, ultimately seeking to "spur each another on towards love and good works". My prayer is for the music at Good Sam to be something that through the power of the Holy Spirit, reflects and illuminates the Gospel message, and leads us towards a deeper love and relationship with Jesus Christ.
