Our education committee with oversight by Beth Hannaman is working intently on new programs and coordination of Christian Education for our youth of all ages starting this fall. We are setting the agenda and planning for our annual August home forums. I have written an initial announcement about the forums below\*\*, which I hope you will want to attend. PARISH HOME FORUMS – coming soon to a home near you!

Fr. Chase and your Vestry will once again hold two-hour home forum meetings during the last week of August, three evenings and one Sunday afternoon. The purpose is to meet with parishioners in an informal and interactive setting to encourage discussion by parishioners of their views of our programs, priorities, and challenges, and to have them reflect on their own roles. The theme this year will be "Back To The Future" and the program will include discussions on reaching out under our new logo, setting vision for our ministries, and the use of technology in our education programs. Before the vestry begins its fall planning to set priorities and stewardship goals, we wish to simply listen to what new ideas and fresh thoughts may be out there amongst parishioners. Four parishioners have agreed to open their homes so everyone will be able to choose a time and place that is most convenient for them to attend. As we get closer you will be asked to let the host know by phone or email that you expect to attend. It will be a good opportunity for the many new members to learn more about their parish and to share their aspirations for Good Samaritan as their place of worship. Our new Parish Life Director, Hanna Hake, will also join us at each of the forums to listen and

share her experiences and commitment. More details will appear in the Church Bulletins, but if you have questions feel free to ask Dave Miller, Beth Hannaman, or Fr. Chase.

### *Vestry in Brief*

8 June 2010

#### **Rector’s Report: Rev Chris Chase**

- The branding team meets Thursday June 10th to review the consultant’s proposal for branding program elements, including a logo.
- It’s been wonderful having Parish Life Director Hanna Hake work with the staff. She has clear ideas and offers questions as to why things are done as they are. She will chair a meeting on Saturday morning June 12 with the heads of the church committees and ministries.
- We’ll be moving into Roetter Hall for liturgy, and will use the projector and screen to post the program and the bulletins. It will be a technology experiment for us while the sanctuary is being renovated.

#### **Senior Warden’s Report: Dave Miller**

- The home forums are shaping up for August and will be held in Carmel Valley, University City, and Scripps Ranch on Aug. 22, 24, 25, and 26. The vestry is invited to attend as many as they can. Home forums give parishioners a chance to come and chat about the church and its programs. The auction is the same week.
- Renovations go June 21 to July 31.
- The budget committee will use input from the home forums to help define what is needed monetarily for the projects that are discussed. Jane Davis will chair the committee.
- Men’s retreat is Nov. 12-14 and the Ingathering will be the same weekend after their return.

#### **Sanctuary Refurbishment Project: Jay Smith**

- The pews will be removed June 28 followed by two weeks for painting, and a week for carpeting with the pews reinstalled by Aug. 3rd. The sanctuary will be reopened Aug. 8th for services and there is a wedding on Aug. 14th. The office will be closed the week of June 28th for renovations in that area.
- Putting a wall between the nursery and the sanctuary as originally proposed has building code complications so will not be part of the current renovation.

#### **Vestry Auction Trip: Beth Hannaman**

- A bus trip to the Huntington Library and gardens in San Marino will be the vestry’s contribution to the auction, and is tentatively scheduled for Oct. 9. It will include a presentation on the bus on the way to the museum, a tour, and possibly lunch. The vestry will provide bus treats.

#### **Ministries Updates**

- Music Director Braden McKinley’s wedding will be celebrated with a cake after Sunday service the 13th. The children’s Christian education programs are being designed into blocks of several weeks that will concentrate on age-appropriate activities; Apple iPads will enhance the teen’s program. The E-scrip program is under review and needs to be updated; it is an easy way to add income to the church. The program needs a person to bring it up to date. July 24th is a newcomer’s event is a patio party. Family camp was very successful and may become an annual event. The summer breakfasts are scheduled.

### *Health Tip*

Avocados: appetizing and alimental. A study has found that a diet including avocados can help get cholesterol levels into the healthy range. In the study, after 7 days LDL ("bad") cholesterol and triglyceride levels dropped by 22 percent and HDL ("good") cholesterol shot up 11 percent. Avocados are a good source of vitamin K, dietary fiber, potassium, and folate. Avocados are very low in sodium and cholesterol-free but they do contain fat so eat in moderation.

## TREASURER'S REPORT

Treasurer's Report Summary of May 2010 Financial Activity of Operating Fund		
	This Month	Year to Date
Income	\$ 47,198	\$ 249,238
Expenses	\$ 43,219	\$ 222,065
Operating increase / (decrease)	\$ 3,979	\$ 27,173

Our May total income was less than we had expected; offerings were up by about \$1,900 but our "other income" was down by \$6,790 (primarily due to the decrease in value of our investments). Overall, we had a total of about \$5,200 less than we budgeted.

Our May total expenses were also less than we had expected: Our Staff Expenses were about \$5,040 less than we had budgeted primarily due to our Director of Parish Life is not yet working full time as planned. Our expenses for Administration were about \$1,350 less than expected, our Property Expenses were about \$1,600 less than expected, our Debt Service Expenses were about \$920 less than expected, but our ministry expenses were about \$1,320 more than expected. Overall we spent about \$7,870 less than we had budgeted.

So, both our income was and our expenses were less than expected, with our actual income about \$3,980 more than our expenses. This makes it appear as if we have received \$27,173 more than we have expended, but our "income" for the year includes \$28,780 transferred from our reserves, so we are actually just about breaking even.

This next month sees the beginning of the redoing of the pews and carpets in the main building. Most of the expenses for this operation should be covered by donations we have received over the past year for the Pew Fund, which is separate from the Operating Fund that this report deals with.
