## Reflections from the Rector

As we celebrate and end our Christian Education program for the year on June 22 we do so recognizing the wonderful Christian education program we offer. From the Catechesis of the Good Shepherd to adult education we have provided children and adult alike with great opportunities to learn. A big congratulations to all the teachers including: Wendy Poyhonen and Rebecca Chase - Catechesis of the Good Shepherd; Joanie Sedgmore and Jan Stearns - Godly Play; Kathleen Ide and Susan MacDougall—Godly Play 2; Susan Davis, John Lawrence, Stephane Genoud - Middle School; and Bill Hannaman and Margaret Bookwalter - High School. Also, much thanks to all those who did substitute work through the year.

Also, many of these folks are instrumental in shaping the Education Committee (Fractal) which meets once a month on the second Sunday of the month. The purpose is to check in with one another and plan and vision the future of our education program. Next year this Committee (Fractal) will include a representative from the Adult Education Fractal which is doing great work in coming up with creative programming and offerings for all adults. The Education Committee (Fractal) has been led by Joanie Sedgmore who agreed, after she completed her term on the vestry, to help build this committee. Joanie has decided to “retire” from being head and so we take this opportunity to thank Joanie for all of her dedicated and hard work.

When I was called to Good Samaritan I was charged to develop an education program for the adult population, a program that would compliment what

was already an outstanding program to our children. The most sensible place to offer this comprehensive education offering was between the two services. That would allow both services to participate - there are several families that attend the 8am service. So, this year saw us move to a comprehensive education hour between the two services. We were able to do this with the completion of Roetter Hall which was designed to provide classroom space for the program. The Hall has proved to be a great success in enhancing our programming, for example the AV system has been used extensively in the education offerings. It has been decided that we will continue with this education hour next year, beginning September 7.

However, there will be NO Christian education offered in July and August so all can have Sabbath time.

BUT, before we begin our new “academic year” in September I need to raise an issue. Despite the quality of the program and the quality of the teachers attendance for the Sunday school is not deserving of its quality. Now, before one reads this and becomes too concerned about Good Samaritan please note that this is the case across the nation; Sunday Schools, at least in the Episcopal church are, generally, poorly attended.

But, that said, I guess my question is, ( and I have been asking this question my entire ordained life, including Massachusetts and Tennessee where there are the same issues), is Christian education that important for our children? The numbers seem to indicate not. So why have an education program? And if we have one to what end, what is

the purpose? What is it we hope that our children, and thereby our community, will get out of it?

Some have suggested that it is a timing issue. That when it was later, during the service, more children came. This is in part true, the numbers were larger but not significantly. And it needs to be noted that the "Children's Chapel," which parallels the worship service at 10:15, is very well attended. But, it is intentionally designed as a worship service to enable our children to worship their God - and worship is the reason for our being. Children's Chapel is not designed as an educational opportunity nor, do I think it ought to be. However, if it is a timing issue the question must be asked, is there a better time for us to meet and "do" education? Is there a space in our overscheduled lives, and I include the Chase family, when we could see ourselves driving over to Good Samaritan so that our children can receive some immersion in the Christian story, and be shaped and formed by that story?

I actually have no agenda here other than to ask the question, is Christian education for our children a vital part of this community? Trust me, there is no "guilt" trip intended. We all struggle to meet the demands that our culture places upon our children and our families. Sunday mornings are not Sabbath any more and it does no good to pretend that they are or should be. How can we, if we so desire, make children's Christian education work for our community?

### *Vestry in Brief*

May 13, 2008

#### **Sr. Warden's Report**

Rev. Chris Chase will be gone May 29 to June 2nd for a trip to Tennessee to sponsor several of his former students who are in seminary. The UCSD tutoring group called "One Step Group" has requested use of Good Samaritan facilities over the summer

(June 16th to Aug. 30th) to tutor K-12 children. Their program is described at [www.onestepgroup.org](http://www.onestepgroup.org). We are looking at this as part of the campus ministry.

#### **Facilities Updates**

The two beams leading to the church need to be replaced for safety (dry rot) and will cost \$7000-\$8000. Beams are now the first priority and irrigation is second priority. Drywall by the nursery needs repair. Landscape planning of Roetter Hall and the Memorial Garden is under way. Thrift Shop discussion covered many items: using Craig's List to sell items as they become available to eliminate some of the storage needs; what kind of storage to provide for thrift shop rummage sales; the idea of not collecting any goods until 2 weeks before sales to avoid onsite storage; costs to store stuff onsite (pod rental, parking availability); the storage pod blocks the view of the church from Genesee south at Eastgate Mall. The storage pod will be removed as soon as practical.

#### **Newcomers Picnic – May 17th**

This Saturday from 5 to 7 is the newcomer's gathering which will include numerous families and as many as ten children. The vestry is invited.

#### **Ministries Fair June 8**

June 8th will be a ministry fair to introduce church members and visitors to all the different ministries the church is involved with, and to give them opportunities to choose if and how to get involved.

#### **Summer Service/Breakfast**

Summer schedule begins June 29th with one service at 9:15 through the end of August. Breakfasts will be held in Roetter Hall during the summer. This is a prime fellowship opportunity for Good Samaritans and visitors.

There will be no August vestry meeting.

## Evangelism 101

If you ask anyone at Good Samaritan Church what our goals are I am sure you will receive many variations on "growing the church". If you ask how we'll do this, I don't think many people will be able to provide an answer. This isn't unusual. According to Charles Fulton and James Lemler, most Episcopal churches define growth as a priority but only 17% have an active program to recruit new members (Truth and Hope: A Time of Truth and Hope for the Episcopal Church, Forward Movement Publications).

Well, I have an answer that I want to share with all of you: EVANGELISE. And here's how to do it - talk to people.

As you build relationships with the people you talk to, you'll gain a sense of where their spiritual hunger lies. You'll become aware of unmet spiritual needs they have. Talk to them about your spiritual journey and your spiritual needs. That's when you can start talking to them about how God the Father, Jesus the Redeemer, and the Holy Spirit can help fill that spiritual need.

It all starts with your spiritual relationship with God and your willingness to share that relationship with other people.

In order to help you find what motivates you to bring others to Christ,

take some time to look at the motives for evangelization listed below. Find the one on the list that speaks to you the most strongly and meditate on it for a while. Why does it speak to you? What does it tell you about your spiritual journey? What is Good Samaritan doing to help you on your journey? How can you share this spiritual journey with people who do not have a church home? When you can answer these questions, you are ready to evangelize.

1. Jesus answered, "I am the way and the truth and the life. No one comes to the Father except through me. John 14:6
2. The Spirit of the Lord is on me, because he has anointed me to preach good news to the poor. Luke 4:18
3. I will search for the lost and bring back the strays. I will bind up the injured and strengthen the weak. Ezekiel 34:16
4. Therefore go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit. Matthew 28:19
5. Repentance and forgiveness of sins is to be preached in his name to all nations. Luke 24:47
6. I have come that they may have life, and have it more abundantly. John 10:10

### *Book Review*

#### **The Benedictine Way**

For the last few months, I've been reading books about Benedictines and the Rule of their founder, St. Benedict, which they live by. It's been a wee bit of an obsession since my visit to the Benedictine monastery of Mt. Calvary a few years ago. It was such a deeply spirit-filled experience, I wanted to learn more. There are beaucoup books on the subject, I discovered.

The first book I was "The Cloister Walk" by Kathleen Norris. This had come recommended by a number of different people. As I started reading it, I found myself reading it as a fellow writer. So Kathleen's story read like her growth as a writer, with her spiritual journey as secondary. The book splintered toward the end with more stand-alone essays on various aspects of the Benedictine life. I learned snippets of Benedictine life and certainly those aspects which meant the most or fascinated the author. But the book served only to tantalize and not answer.

I moved onto Esther de Waal's work "Seeking God: The Way of St. Benedict". The long paragraphs made this difficult reading for the postmodern me who is used to short

paragraphs. I know, I am uncouth. However, about halfway through, I rediscovered the rhythm of long paragraphs and read it a lot better than the earlier sections. There's a lot of excellent information in here, covering all the themes of St. Benedict's Rule in great detail. Best taken in short bites.

The next thing I plan to do is actually read St. Benedict's Rule. I've been told its short. I do remember my history lessons in choosing primary over secondary material, after all. Stay tuned.

### *Presiding Bishop's Address at Good Samaritan*

On the afternoon of April 5th, there was a definite festive air as people gathered from all over the Diocese of San Diego to hear their Presiding Bishop, the Most Rev. Katharine Jefferts-Schori speak about a reasoned faith.

The church and chapel were filled, with the number of people being over 600. As the Presiding Bishop walked in, she got a standing ovation. Then Mike Angell, Campus Missioner to UCSD and soon-to-be-seminarian, welcomed everyone to Good Sam. Our Bishop, Jim Mathes introduced the Presiding Bishop, invoking lots of laughter as he did so.

Bishop Jefferts-Schori told her faith story, in a rather summarized form but touched on the main points and her personal struggle with reconciling both science (she was an oceanographer) and faith. I really liked hearing her say that when she came to the Episcopal Church having been a Catholic, she found the Episcopal church an intimate community, where one is able to get to know individuals as human beings. It was also very cool to hear that the church she went to in Oregon was the Church of the Good Samaritan!

I personally found that she radiated calm, listened well to the questions asked of her, and spoke with a careful consideration that had none of the ego or self-importance that one might expect from someone in her station. This highly intelligent woman was real, authentic and honest. I went in having heard raves about her, but wanting to see for myself. She really impressed me (in case you couldn't tell).

Two of our own asked questions: Joan Stein and Col. Bob Dingeman. Many thanks to the hard work put in by the Daughters of the King, led for this enterprise by Germaine Bergeron-Lynn, as they put the ECS cookies on platters and prepared and served punch for the reception on a chilly marine-layer patio.
